Good evening and a massive warm welcome to everyone who has been able to attend tonight's game – we've really missed you all at matches, welcome back! And welcome also to those of you watching on the stream and listening to commentary online – our supporters are all highly-valued, wherever you are supporting us from.

I'd also like to welcome our visitors, Eastleigh, their manager Ben Strevens, his players and staff to the EBB Stadium. Eastleigh are having another good season and are still in with a shout of the play-offs and will present strong opposition for tonight's game.

Saturday's game was ultimately disappointing, ending as it did in a 3:1 loss for ourselves. It was a tough one and I lost it a little bit with the lads afterwards, probably more out of frustration than anything else because I think we deserved more out of the game. I thought Hartlepool were very good and I was impressed with the way they played but I thought we had done enough to maybe get something out of the game. When you lose a game to mistakes it just makes things so much harder to take whereas if they'd cut us open, like with the shot that George blocked on the line in the first half, if that had been a goal you would have said what a good one it was. We

should have done better with the first two goals and although I can see why the ref gave the penalty at the end, watching it back there was no contact, the player made contact with Jamie!

When I watched the game back on Sunday I thought we played well. We weathered that first 10/15 minute spell which we knew would happen and we controlled large parts of the game, but Hartlepool came away with the win and that's why they are where they are and we are where we are.

Eastleigh have also had a really good season. I think Strevs and his coaching staff have done a good job there and they have been consistent over the last two or three years. That's something that we have looked at, not just with Eastleigh but with quite a few of the teams who are up near the top of the table. The players they've got are all similar players, they add one or two a season but generally the squad stays the same. When you've got that you know that you're going to have continuity. They've only lost one game in the last five so it's going to be a tough game tonight. We should have won the game at their place last October so hopefully we can emulate that kind of performance and this time make sure we get ourselves over the line.

And of course we will be playing in front of supporters too, which is what we have all been looking forward to so much. However many supporters are in the ground, it's going to be so much better than none and I know those of you who are here this evening will make a lot of noise - the boys are buzzing and can't wait to play in front of you all.

Continuing with Academy theme, a few weeks ago it was great to see Harry Taylor return to the EBB playing for Charlton Athletic FC. One of our boys!





I heartily applaud the formation of @HerGameToo, a new campaign run by female football fans which has recently appeared on Twitter to raise awareness of sexist abuse in the game. Its purpose is to offer support and help to women involved in the game of football, be they fans, working for a club or working in football media. Their simple but striking video where woman wearing football shirts pass pieces of paper to each other which display many of the unpleasant and sexist comments made to women from those who feel they shouldn't be involved in football or have an opinion on it has now been watched by over 1,000,000 people. The downright ignorance of some of those comments is phenomenal - You can't comment, it's a man's game, You know nothing about football, you're a woman, Do you even know the offside rule? - are just a few taken from the oneminute video. I am fully aware of the fact that these remarks come from an incredibly tiny percentage of people and in no way do they represent the main proportion of male football supporters but as with everything in life, it is the small but vocal minority who often ruin things for everyone else.

Unpleasant and rude though they were, incredibly I felt some of the comments were quite mild compared to those I have seen directed at presenters such as Alex Scott, Karen Carney and Sky's Michelle Owen on social media where even her appearance and parenting skills have been questioned (not sure what that's got to do with football) but all of them had several things in common-they showed ignorance, they

showed rudeness and they showed sexism and that kind of intolerance needs to be fought against wherever and whoever it is targeted at.

I'm going to be honest here, I have watched football since 1975, principally here at The Recreation Ground and worked in one form or another for this club since 2012 and I can't remember ever receiving an outright sexist remark addressed directly at me; not on the terrace, not at my programme content, not on my Twitter account and not from my colleagues or employers. Young footballers who are probably more used to being interviewed by media graduates in their twenties have never once looked askance at me when I rock up to interview them for the programme, even if they weren't expecting a women in her mid-50s! I've worked with six different managers, four different media managers, stood on the terrace both here and up and down the country and as mentioned above, interviewed over 100 footballers and have never been challenged about my 'right' to talk and write about football. I am very grateful for this.

However #HerGameToo isn't about me, it's about the many hundreds and 1,000s of women who are tired of receiving sexist misogynistic, and abusive attacks on them when all they want to do is watch, talk about and work in the game we all love - some of them are my fellow supporters here at Aldershot Town. The level of anger in the comments seen on social media is frightening, the lack of tolerance incredible.

In the Big Interview feature in today's programme our assistant manager, Anwar Uddin, talks about his work with the Football Supporters Association and particularly on his work in trying to make football as inclusive as possible, and that is something we can all get alongside and become part of. Football has just had the toughest year of its life and many clubs are reeling under the loss of income. What better time than now to make football as accessible and as open to everyone, regardless of gender, belief, ability or religion? Make it the welcoming place where people can enjoy themselves, join together once again in sociable groups and watch the match, regardless of who or what we are. As Anwar says, it might take effort, it might take an investment in time, we might even face some opposition - but it can be done and in the doing, we can only bring benefits and positivity to the game of football, the game we all love so much.



GRAHAM LOUCH

Aldershot Town FC was saddened to hear of the recent passing of Shots supporter, Graham Louch. He was a lifetime fan, first seeing the Shots in the pre-war years. He then introduced his son, Mark, to the Club and he has been a regular here too since the late 60s. Graham was a season ticket holder until the 2019-20 season with his final position in the ground being the Directors' Box. Prior to that after a one season experiment in the South Stand, he had always stood on the East Bank, his preferred option by a mile!

Whilst he was never brilliant at remembering names, including those of his children, he could recall in graphic detail the war years where Mercer and Lawton etc graced the Rec, as well as remembering very



fondly names like Howfield, Melia, Brodie, Walden and Howarth. Saturdays and Tuesday nights at the Rec provided so many happy memories, with the Shrewsbury FA Cup game being a particular favourite (he blamed Will Dixon rather than Crosby) as well of course as a few lowlights over the years. The demise of the Club in 1992 was a desperate time and he was one of many who was at the Officers Club as it was reinvented, including the purchase of a few shares.

He enjoyed the new era greatly, with the Waddock promotion year being the absolute highlight, accompanied as ever by some disappointments. The day we drew with Barrow after being two up in the last five minutes and them down to nine players summed up his view that we could always snatch defeat from the jaws of victory.

Over 80+ years, through thick and thin, he supported the Shots and all the friends he made at the Rec!



Aldershot Town assistant manager, Anwar Uddin, is a very busy man. When I call him on Wednesday morning, the day after Shots' 2:0 win over Yeovil Town, he points out with humour, that Danny and the players are still in bed but he is already up and working!

This is because Anwar shares his time with Aldershot Town with the job he has held for seven years, Diversity and Campaigns Manager at the Football Supporters Association and leading the Fans for Diversity Campaign with Kick it Out, and it is a balance he has perfected having also previously been first team coach at Maidstone United and managing Sporting Bengal United, Ware and Glebe.

His playing career saw the east Londoner start out at West Ham before moving to Sheffield Wednesday and Bristol Rovers. Signing for Dagenham and Redbridge where he captained the side in 2004, he made 188 appearances over six years and was part of the squad that gained promotion to the Football League in 2007. He then joined Barnet where he was also captain indeed, Anwar was the first British-Asian to captain a side in the top four divisions, and he made his first steps towards his coaching career when he was made caretaker assistant manager with the Bees at the end of the 2010-11 season. However, there was also a keen interest in football governance and he moved into the role with the Football Supporters Association when he retired from playing in 2013, and has coupled that that with his coaching career ever since.

'I'm really proud of the work I do. When I retired from football I started to work on fan engagement, working around discrimination and equality and I've worked for the likes of Kick it Out and the Football Supporters Association for the last seven years, basically trying to

make our football as inclusive as possible. And what that means is that we work with football fans all over the country. We've got 800,000 members, it's free to join, anyone can become a member and we work with fans on a number of things because the FSA are like the voice of football fans. We are doing a lot of work at the moment around governance and reform because recently everyone will have seen the top six try to break away from football and into a super league, so there is a lot of work that we are doing around better governance and ownership around football and making sure that football is kept in the tradition and history for fans, and that is important.

'So generally that is to do with fans, but what I do specifically is work on the equality aspect of that, working on all forms of discrimination and on all strands of diversity. I work with older fans, younger fans, fans from the LGBTQ+ community, fans from under-represented groups like the Asian community, the black community, the Nepalese community. I work with different faith groups, disabled fans. I am extremely busy but it's something that I am really passionate about.'

With his long playing career in football, alongside his mixed heritage, Anwar is well-placed to understand the changes that are needed in football, both on and off the pitch and feels that football itself can be an agent for change.

'For me, it's interesting to be in the position as an explayer and go around clubs and help them whether it's a strategy around fan engagement, equality, or to work with fans and make things better for them and their clubs. Having played for 20 years as one of the only British Asians in the country I've seen a lot and I've heard a lot and I feel like football can be a place where we can really complement change. In society there's not many places where on a Saturday, everyone in a town or a city comes together regardless of who you are, where you are from, puts on a shirt and watches their team. I think there's something magical about that and for me, it's about making individuals realise that we can all do a little bit more for each other.'

Last week was Mental Health Awareness Week and mental health has very much come under the spotlight in more recent times, along with the need to take the matter far more seriously than maybe it has been in the past, along with ensuring we all look after one another. Again, Anwar was very much involved in this.

'Every single day this week I'm on a Webinar. I've got a Government Webinar and fans Webinars on Thursday - because it's important that fans are there for each other. It's important that when you ask someone how they are you actually say, are you OK? How are things with you? Because we never know what people are going through. So these are the kinds of things I'm trying to raise awareness with and to be honest, it's something that I work so hard to do.'

Prior to last year, Anwar's work saw him travelling up and down the country to meet with supporters and clubs. The pandemic has curtailed this for the timebeing but still the work goes on, via Zoom and Webinars. Some of that work is focussed on looking to find ways to deal with the abuse that is flung around in football, sometimes from the terraces but more often now, from social media accounts.

'I'm passionate about it and I really want to drive change. Clubs like Aldershot, Manchester United - clubs from all over the country, I want the doors to be open, I want fans to be able to embrace football, to be able to go and watch a game, just to enjoy it and get involved in it. We don't want to sanitise football, we don't want to make it anything different, we want to have that aggression, that atmosphere, but ultimately, it's about making people realise there's a fine line between being a football fan and doing the right things and being offensive and abusive.

'And that's not just on the terraces, it's on social media too. We are doing a lot of work with the government at the moment about trying to reduce the

amount of online hate crime which is really common. I know I'm talking about racism, homophobia, mental health, disability, but actually it all links in to mental health as well. If you are a player or a fan, no one should be abused because of the colour of their skin or their religion or their sexual orientation.'

Anwar's role here at Aldershot Town means he is right at the sharp end of football, involved on a day to day basis with coaching and players which can then feed into his other work. He is very happy to be working for the Shots, too.

'I feel very, very honoured to be able to be the assistant manager at Aldershot Town. Because my job is very flexible, I don't have set hours, it's like, I've got so much to do but Anwar, do it in your own time – I work evenings, in the days, I sometimes work at the weekends, I've got no real nine to five. But what that has done over the last six years has given me an opportunity to stay in football. I was doing that part-time in non-league and now I'm doing that at Aldershot. I have the flexibility at work, I can come in and do the games and my organisation are fully behind what I do because they want to encourage my development and they know I love football and that's also important for me.

'I'm a British Asian and how many British Asians are there on the touchline in football - there isn't? So for me it's about representation, every time I have the privilege to stand on the touchline at Aldershot it's an honour for me. And I can see the Bangladeshi flag every single home game on the East Bank, people don't realise just how much that means to me. I put a picture of it up on Instagram and I had about 200 messages from people from Bangladesh saying that's amazing and on Facebook I had about 1,000 messages. People were saying, there aren't many Bangladeshi flags flying high over football stadiums in this country - that's part of change, and that's the beautiful thing about football, that you can do that, you can give someone an opportunity.

'I'm mixed heritage, my mum's English and my dad's Bangladeshi, but I'm from east London and I've been given the opportunity to have a really fantastic career and now I'm able to coach and manage at Aldershot which I'm privileged to do. Obviously I have to thank Danny Searle for bringing me into the Club and making me part of his management team.'

Anwar is clearly enjoying co-ordinating his work with the Shots with his role at the FSA, despite the long hours it entails and it's obvious that the supporters are something that really matter to him, driving him to always find the time to get everything achieved. He is also responsible for one of the FSA's most well-known campaigns.

'It's a crazy story! So I'll have a game with Aldershot, say Torquay away, I get home at 5am and I've got a Zoom meeting with Manchester United at 9am! There's not many people who probably do that but for me, it's that I love the game, I can't get enough of it – I love the Club and I love what I do.

'I'm so passionate about change. I created the Fans for Diversity campaign six years ago and I created it from scratch and it's just exploded, and that's because people buy into it. Fans for Diversity is all about fans getting together to make football as inclusive as possible, making football open and beautiful for everyone so they can embrace it. And to see people in my t-shirts all over the world and clubs like Tottenham

in the Premier League tweeting my work from their main accounts makes it all worthwhile.'

And rightly, there is interest in the work of the FSA from the very top of football.

'I had an hour and a half with Gareth Southgate last week on Zoom, he wanted to meet some of the fan groups I work with. We do events every single day from the Premier League all the way down to non-league and it's amazing. And one of the big things about the work I do is that we have funds available. So if any football fan wants to do something that is productive around inclusion, be that helping a community to come and watch the games, creating banners, t-shirts, flags – then contact me! Because the funding is there and it's about actually making the most of it.'



INTRODUCING BEASTLEIGHT

Eastleigh arrive at the EBB Stadium lying in 10th place in the table, on 59 points. However, they still have an outside chance of making the play-offs due to their having two games in hand over the three teams above them, including Chesterfield in seventh place, currently on 63 points.

Saturday afternoon saw the Spitfires canter to a comfortable 3:0 win over Barnet down at the Silverlake Stadium and they will come into this evening's match on a run of three wins from four games, their only recent loss being to promotion-chasing Torquay United on 1 May.

In goal for Eastleigh was Joe McDonnell. McDonnell is in his first campaign with the Spitfires and has made 41 appearances, keeping 15 clean sheets in the league.

The back four consisted of Joseph Tomlinson, Pierce Bird, Andrew Boyce and Alex Wynter. Full back Tomlinson arrived in the summer of 2020 and has had a fine season, making 39 appearances and scoring 10 goals including a penalty on Saturday. He also scored in the 2:2 draw between the Shots and Eastleigh last October, Eastleigh's opening goal of the game. Centre-back Pierce Bird was another new arrival in Hampshire this season, having previously played in France. Boyce has been with Eastleigh since 2017 and has joined the Club's centurion's list and Wynter, after an injury-hit 2019-20 campaign has made 18 appearances for the team this season, standing strong in the centre-back position.

In midfield for Eastleigh were Michael Green, Cavanagh Miley and Jack Payne. Green is a Club legend who holds the most appearances record in the current squad. This season he has added further 39 to that total. Miley has made 32 appearances with three goals while Payne has made 38 appearances this season, scoring once.

Up front, former Shots youth product Ben House has made 36 appearances and been on target 10 times, the last being the 17 April match away to Notts County where he scored the only goal of the game. Tyrone Barnett is leading goalscorer at Eastleigh this season and scored his 11th of the campaign on Saturday, the opening goal of the 3:0 win over Barnet, and Adam Marriott is on 30 appearances with nine goals to his name.

HISTORY

Eastleigh have had the best of encounters with The Shots historically since both teams arrived in the National League, with seven wins; there have been four draws and two Shots victories. In recent times Aldershot's fortunes have been on the upturn with the Spiffires, last season seeing the first ever league victory over Eastleigh here at the EBB, a 3:1 win on New Year's Day, the goals coming from an Ethan Chislett brace and one from Craig Tanner. Later that month, on 28 January 2020, the Shots secured another point against their Hampshire neighbours, this time down at the Silverlake Stadium, with a 0:0 draw. And a further point was gained there earlier this season in October in a 2:2 draw. Eastleigh went ahead through a Joe Tomlinson penalty in the 42nd minute but Craig Tanner put the teams level on the stroke of half-time. Alfy Whittingham then put the Shots into the lead on the hour before Eastleigh snatched a point when Alex Wynter headed home past Mitch Walker in injury time.



THE BOSS BEN STREVENS

Born on 24 May 1980 in Edgeware, Ben returned to Eastleigh for a second spell in December 2016 from Whitehawk. Ben has also played for Wingate & Finchley, Barnet (195/42), Slough Town, St Albans City, Crawley Town (15/4), Dagenham & Redbridge (125/35), Brentford (25/6), Wycombe Wanderers (76/11) and Gillingham (12/1). At the start of the 2017-18 campaign he became a member of then-Eastleigh boss Andy Hessenthaler's coaching team. When Hessenthaler left the Spitfires in October to take charge at Dover Athletic, Strevens was moved into the position of interim manager. A run of games through October which saw two wins, two draws and just one defeat led to Ben being awarded the post on a permanent basis on 5 November, 2018.

Strevens had a successful first season in charge, leading the Spitfires all the way to the 2018-19 National League play-off semi-finals where they were defeated by eventual winners, Salford City. Last season was curtailed in March due to Covid-19 but in his second full season in charge, Strevens once again has his team challenging for the play-offs.





1 Joe McDonnell

Goalkeeper- McDonnell is a new arrival for the 2020/21 season from fellow National League side Notts County. The 26-year-old also holds Football League experience with AFC Wimbledon, where he played for five and a half years before his move to the Magpies.

Joe began his footballing career at Basingstoke Town under Jason Bristow, who is now Assistant Manager at Eastleigh, and the pair have reunited at the Spitfires this season.



10 TYRONE BARNETT

Striker - Barnett left Cheltenham Town in July 2019 to make the switch to Eastleigh. The established Football League goal scorer joined the Spitfires with plenty of experience in his career, from the Championship with Peterborough United and Ipswich Town as well as spells in League One and League Two. The Posh paid Crawley Town over £1 million for his signature in 2012 and alongside current team-mate Jack Payne, the pair won the Football League Trophy together during the 2013/14 season.

He continued his goal scoring records in his first season at the Spitfires, finishing as top scorer with 12 goals in last year's National League campaign.



15 ALEX WYNTER

Centre-back – Wynter signed from Maidstone United in 2018. Spending his youth career at Crystal Palace, Wynter made his debut for the Eagles in the FA Cup at just 16-years-old. After several loan spells, he joined Colchester United permanently in 2015, featuring in both League One and Two for the U's.

He spent the 2017/18 season at Maidstone United, captaining the England 'C' team and helping Maidstone survive in their debut National League season.

Wynter was ever-present at the heart of Eastleigh's defence in his debut season for the Spitfires, making 45 appearances and scoring four goals in the run to the 2018/19 play-offs, earning him the Player of the Season award. After an injury-hit season in 2019/20, Wynter is now back to full fitness.



11 SAM SMART

Winger - Talented young winger Sam Smart joined the Spitfires from Evo-Stick South side Basingstoke Town FC in July 2019, and has quickly become a fan favourite at the club. His electric pace and strong delivery make him a threat from the flanks, and his acrobatic goal celebrations are much loved by the Spitfires supporters.

Smart made 38 appearances last season in all competitions for the club, scoring three goals.

2 Joe Partington

Right-back. Partington re-signed for Eastleigh in 2019 following his release from Bristol Rovers. In a two-year stay, he made 63 appearances with the League One club.

He began his career with Portsmouth before spending four years with Bournemouth. After brief loan spells with Eastbourne and Aldershot Town, Partington joined Eastleigh on a free transfer from the Cherries. The experienced defender went on to win the Spitfires' Player of the Year in the 2015/2016 season and scored the opener in Eastleigh's 3-2 loss against Bolton in the 2016 FA Cup third round. He has been capped at youth level by Wales, making 21 appearances from the U17 to U21 age groups.

3 Michael Green

Left-back. Club legend and fan favourite Michael Green holds the most Spitfires appearances in the current squad, and has the fifth highest appearances in the Club's history. Green was signed from Port Vale in 2011 and has since played more than 370 games for the club. He was part of the side that won promotion to the National League during the 2013/14 season.

After briefly departing the club in February 2017, he returned just a matter of weeks later and has been at the Silverlake Stadium since.

Green remains ever-important to Eastleigh's back-line, accumulating 38 appearances en route to the National League play-off semi-final in 2018/19.

4 Cavaghn Miley

Centre-midfield. Miley joined Eastleigh in 2017 from Jersey side St Pauls, and has since appeared over 100 times for the club. Before moving to the Silverlake, he captained the Jersey Official Football Team whilst living on the island and caught the eye of the Spitfires.

The central-midfielder played in all bar four National League games in the 2018/19 run to the playoffs.

He was also selected for England C side against the Football Association of Ireland Amateur International XI in 2018.

5 Pierce Bird

Centre-back. Bird is another new addition for the 2020/21 season, the second summer signing from Notts County. The 21-year-old started his career at Dunkirk before moving to the Magpies, where he made 26 appearances at League Two and National League level. The centre-back is also capped at international level, with four appearances for Northern Ireland's U21s.

6 Andrew Boyce

Centre-back. Signed from Grimsby Town in 2017, Boyce is a well-rounded and reliable defender. During the 2014/15 season whilst at Scunthorpe United, he gained promotion to League One. As well as plenty of National League experience, Boyce is no stranger to playing in higher divisions with over 50 appearances in League One and League Two combined. The centre-back joined the 100-club for Eastleigh as well last season, and has scored four goals in his four seasons with the Spitfires.

7 Abdulai Baggie

Winger. Baggie is another summer signing ahead of the 2020/21 season, having joined from National League South promotion winners, Weymouth. The 28-year-old winger has plenty of experience in both the Football League and non-league, featuring for the likes of Tranmere Rovers, Stockport County, and Weymouth before joining the Spitfires. Baggie has represented England four times at youth level, before making five appearances for the Sierra Leone national side.

8 Jack Payne

Centre-midfield. Jack Payne became a permanent signing in 2019 from Ebbsfleet United, after spending a brief spell on loan at Eastleigh the season before. Payne is a very experienced midfielder, playing in the Championship, League One and League Two throughout his career thus far, with over 100 appearances for both Gillingham FC and Peterborough United. Payne's excellent vision and delivery makes him a threat when on set-pieces, which he has demonstrated in his time at the Club.

9 Dan Smith

Striker. Dan Smith is an exciting new addition to the Spitfires in 2020/21. The young striker was signed from Isthmian League Premier Division side Bognor Regis, after a prolific season scoring 16 goals in 19 games. With competition from teams higher up the football pyramid, Smith is an excellent capture for the Club. The 21-year-old started his footballing journey in youth tournaments with Eastleigh, before joining Portsmouth in 2007 and rising through their academy, making his Pompey debut in the EFL Trophy in 2019.

12 Callum Baughan

Centre-back/full-back. Baughan signed his professional contract with Eastleigh in the summer of 2018, after graduating from the academy. The versatile young defender is highly thought of on and off the pitch at the Club, and has been unlucky with two successive ACL injuries that kept him sidelined for much of the past two campaigns. The young defender made his debut in a 3-1 win over Maidstone in 2018/19, and notched an assist on his first start in a 3-3 draw with Boreham Wood in the final game of that season.



13 Ross Flitney

Goalkeeper. Experienced goalkeeper Ross Flitney has made over 200 appearances for the Spitfires in two spells at the Club. He first featured between 2012 and 2016, then re-joined Eastleigh in 2017 from Bromley. Beginning his youth football career at Arsenal and then with Fulham, Flitney was understudy to Edwin van der Sar in the Premier League from 2003 to 2005. In the latter stages of his career, Flitney is now combining his position with being goalkeeper coach for the first-team and academy goalkeepers.

14 Tom Bearwish

Striker. Bearwish has been at the Club since 2017, progressing his way through the youth system all the way to the first team as a real example for Eastleigh Academy prospects. The forward has now made over 30 appearances for the first-team, with last season proving to be a breakout campaign for 'The Bear'. Bearwish bagged his first goal for the Club with a last-minute winner against Torquay in September 2019, and increased his tally to four goals in all competitions during 2019/20.

16 Ben Scorey

Centre-back/full-back. Another Eastleigh academy graduate, Ben Scorey was promoted from the youth set-up in 2018/19 and made his Spitfires debut in a 3-3 draw against Boreham Wood in April 2019. Scorey has featured four times in all competitions for the Club, proving to be a versatile option in defence.

17 Joe Tomlinson

Full-back. Joe Tomlinson became the first Spitfires signing for the 2020/21 season after joining from Hungerford Town in June 2020. The 20-year-old defender is an exciting prospect, proving to be a talent both offensively and defensively at full-back. Tomlinson was Hungerford Town's captain at just 19-years-old in the National League South last season and was voted the league's Young Player of the Season.

He already has over 70 non-league appearances, with seven goals and 15 assists, so far in his career.

18 Ben House

Striker. Ben House was another summer signing ahead of the 2020/21 season. The 21-year-old striker joined the Spitfires following his release from Championship side, Reading. He spent 2019/20 on loan at fellow National League side Dagenham & Redbridge, scoring twice in 11 games. Despite being born in England, he has represented Scotland at U20 and U21 level.

House has settled in well at the Silverlake as the Club's top scorer during the pre-season campaign, and continued that form in the league. House's five league goals in the first five games earned him the National League Player of the Month in October.

19 Danny Hollands

Centre-midfield. Experienced centre-midfielder and club captain Danny Hollands has made over 100 appearances in his three years with the Spitfires. Hollands began his career with Chelsea and spent three years at Stamford Bridge from 2003. He is well-known on the south coast, having played for Bournemouth and Portsmouth, whilst also featuring for the likes of Charlton Athletic, Gillingham FC, and Crewe Alexandra during his career. Hollands scored a wonder goal against Wrexham in the 2018/19 play-off semi-finals, before finding his form in front of goal last season, bagging 10 goals in the most prolific season of his career.

20 Ryan Hill

Attacking Midfielder/Winger. Ryan Hill is another new addition to the Spitfires, signing during the start of the season on a permanent deal from Hampton & Richmond Borough. Hill started his career at Beaconsfield, before being scouted by Stoke City and joining their youth academy in 2017. After a season with the Potters he moved to Hampton & Richmond to gain regular first-team football, and impressed with his pace and trickery on the ball. Ryan's 2019/20 season saw him score eight goals and get 14 assists in 33 games.

21 Lewis Beale

Striker. Beale is another product of the Eastleigh youth academy that has progressed through the ranks to the first team. A frequent goal scorer at youth level, Beale scored on his first start for the Club last season, in a 2-1 win over Matlock Town in the FA Trophy.

24 Tom Blair

Winger. Tom Blair is the most recent addition to the Spitfires squad in the 2020/21 season. Fitting with the majority of this summer's signings, Blair is a promising young player who impressed in a lower division last season. Tom already became a club legend at Dorchester Town at just 21-years-old, making 153 appearances and scoring 30 goals in his five years at the Club where he rose through the youth ranks to become a vital part of the side. 'Blairo' brings more pace to the flanks and an eye for goal, as well as a more physical presence on the field.

This season sees a new way of looking at Shots games gone past, this time through the medium of goals. But not the most exquisitely executed goals, although there's been plenty of those over the years – the mazy runs, the stunning free-kicks. No, this feature is going to focus on the vital goals, the significant goals, the ones that turned games and seasons, the well-timed goals in the context of the game, turning one point into three, defeat into a dramatic draw or victory over rivals, be that neighbourly or positionally. And a few goals that just announced that the Shots were back. Some were penalties, some were tap-ins, some were out of this world, but whatever they were, they were significant and sent the fans wild. And in all cases they were most definitely golden!

Tim Sills v Accrington Stanley

Sunday 10 August, 2003

Aldershot Town 2 - 1 Accrington Stanley

Goalscorers: Tim Sills, Rosco D'Sane

Nationwide Conference

Attendance: 3,680

Following their promotion as Champions from the Ryman Premier League at the end of the 2002-03 season under manager Terry Brown, Aldershot Town were back playing in a national league for the first time since their expulsion from the Football League 11 years previously.

If it was a momentous day for the Shots, it was equally momentous for their visitors, Accrington Stanley, then as now, managed by John Coleman. Under Coleman, Stanley too had been promoted at the end of the previous campaign, in their case from the Northern Unibond Premier League but not only was this match between two League-winning champion sides, it was also between the last two former Football League sides to lose their status mid-season – the Shots in March 1992, Stanley three decades earlier, in 1962.

The newsworthiness of this match had attracted the Sky TV cameras, hence the match being played 5pm on a Sunday. And although football supporters usually resent their traditional times being meddled with for the purposes of TV, in this case it was probably a blessing as the temperature had been in the midnineties earlier in the day and even now, was essentially far too hot to play football in.

However, the teams had waited a long time for this day and weren't going to let a little thing like heat put them off playing and they both put on a performance worthy of the occasion, one to delight both supporters in the stadium and those watching at home. However, there was one question that needed to be answered – who was going to be Shots' first goal scorer in this most important of games for Aldershot? Whoever it was, they would be the owner of one of many key goals

scored by Shots players throughout the previous 11 years, including Mark Butler (first ever Aldershot Town goal) and Rosco D'Sane (scorer of the goal which essentially clinched the Shots the Ryman League title at Canvey Island earlier in the year) and there were plenty of players on the pitch that day who were more than capable of claiming this new achievement, including D'Sane himself.

One player who was looking to prove himself in front of the Shots supporters was Tim Sills. Tim had been Shots' first signing as a Conference club, arriving from Kingstonian over the summer. While with the Ks Tim had scored 33 goals in 64 appearances and it didn't take long before he was showing the Aldershot Town supporters what he could do – in the 16th minute he headed home from a Stuart Tanfield cross and a new Shots hero was born, scorer of the first ever Aldershot Town goal in the Conference League. It might have been his first ever Shots goal but it certainly wasn't going to be his last.

The Shots went on to win the game 2:1, Rosco D'Sane scoring the winner just before half-time after Accrington had equalised through Andy Proctor. In between those two goals there was great drama, the Stanley keeper, James Speare, being dismissed for hand ball. Despite the opposition going down to 10 men, the Shots were unable to increase their score in the second half – maybe the heat did come into play in the end.

Although nobody knew it at that point, the season was to end in more excitement for the Shots as they went all the way to the play-off final and Tim Sills was key to that journey, making 52 appearances and scoring 21 goals in that wonderful campaign. He was a playing substitute in the play-off final against Shrewsbury and although several clubs in the Football League were reputed to be keen to sign the 25-year-old, he chose to stay with Aldershot Town as they became a full-time club. That second season saw him make 48 appearances, scoring 18 goals as the Club went all the way to the play-off semi-finals and to everyone's delight, he then signed on for a third year with Aldershot Town, in the summer of 2005. However, in January 2006 he could ignore the lure of the Football League no more and signed for Oxford United, attracting a £50,000 fee.

Sadly Tim made only one appearance for the Us and a spell with Hereford United was no better. In 2007 he moved to Torquay United and enjoyed a special time down in Devon, making over 100 appearances for the Seagulls and scoring over 30 goals. In 2011 he returned to play for the Shots under Dean Holdsworth and made a further 19 appearances in the red and blue, adding a further two goals to the 51 he'd previously notched, a brace against Chesterfield.

These days Tim is retired from playing but is still very much involved in football, managing Hamworthy United of the Wessex League, Premier Division. And with such a fine record of appearances and goals here at the EBB Stadium, is rightly a part of Aldershot Town history. Many of those goals were spectacular, many were important, but that very first one in red and blue, scored on a blazing hot day and setting the Shots off on their Conference journey, was most definitely golden...
